We need YOU to look out for the animals and plants around Northumberland to help us plan for the future of wildlife in the county!

What do we want you to do?

Log on to the EYE Project website where you can record your sightings of the animals and plants that you have seen. You might make a sighting in your back garden, local park, on your way to work or when you're out and about in Northumberland. Whether it's a butterfly or a badger, an orchid or an owl, your information is needed.

Who are we?

The Northumberland Biodiversity Partnership works to conserve, enhance and promote biodiversity through the delivery of a Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP) for Northumberland. This plan is designed to protect habitats and species which are special and which we risk losing if we don't take action.

The EYE Project (Exploring Your Environment) enables people to play an active role in recording the wildlife and landscapes of the North East through a website, events programme and volunteer task force. We are also creating a Regional

Environmental Data Hub for the North East, bringing together species and habitat records from many organisations.

Are there any particular species I should look out for?

Your sightings of any type of animal, plant or fungi are useful. Some species that we see every day might become rare in the future. However, the Northumberland BAP has target species that we would particularly like you to look out for. To find out more about these, visit our website.

Why do we need you to log your information?

Information on the number of different species and where they are found is essential to people working to protect the natural environment. Without your information, it's difficult to know how nature is changing and the best way to take action to protect wildlife, habitats and landscapes for the future.

What if I see wildlife and don't know what it is?

Some animals and plants are difficult to identify. Try to take a photograph, check it in a book with good pictures or search on the internet. You could also contact your local wildlife group for advice.
